> The topics presented in African American U.S. History may include perspectives that could be considered controversial, including references to ethnicity, nationality, religion, politics, race, dialect, sexuality, gender or class. The purpose of this content is to provide students with an insight into the challenges faced by African Americans throughout our nation's history. This class requires students to have the level of maturity and skill to thoughtfully consider and analyze diverse perspectives. <u>Welcome</u>

African American History is designed to provide an in depth analysis of the causes, character, and consequences of the African American experience and its influence on America and the world. It begins with a broad geographic, cultural, social, and historical understanding of the African continent, West Africa in particular. The course will continue with the Columbian Exchange between the Americas and Europe.

Then, the course will examine the causes and effects of the trans-Atlantic Slave Trade and the rise of slavery in the Western Hemisphere and how the interaction of African, Native American and Europeans in the "New World" constitutes a unique American experience. The course will then focus on the struggles and triumphs of the development of America from colonial times to the present, with special attention given to the African American experience.

- Contemporary Issues in the African American Community (1990-present)

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


What Students Need For Class

Ms. Kramer's Grading Policies

l. Students are responsible for attending class and completing work as directed.

2. If students miss class it is their responsibility to check the google classroom and seek assistance during homeroom, lunch, or after school.

3. Students are responsible for completing and submitting their assignments to google classroom <u>on time</u>. Incomplete work will not be given any credit.

3. Students who waste class time instead of working on their assignment will not be given additional time to complete their work.


Students are required to wear masks in doors at all times. (This includes the classroom)
